## *Words From Warren . . .*

Springtime in Green Valley is so beautiful. Trees green up, some with blossoms ranging from purple, yellow, white, and pink. Flowers explode from cacti, birds are singing, rabbits are hopping and road runners running. The earth wakes from its winter slumber, and the desert comes back to life.

Back up in the land of snow and ice, whether the northern states or Canada, the springtime is a true time of awakening and great contrasts. Snow and ice-covered ground, dead and brown from winter, seems to be resurrected. What appeared dead is now alive! Shoots of new life spring up out of the ground seeking the warmth of the sun. Warm rains nourish the earth creating a canvas of color.

In the cold areas of the country, springtime is when people finally venture out of their homes, discarding their winter coats and boots, squinting at the sun and breathing in fresh air, no longer feeling the cabin fever as the snow was piling up outside.

The image of winter death being replaced with color and life offers us an image of hope after two years of COVID fears and restrictions. We are slowly coming out of the pandemic winter that isolated us as the virus storm surged around us. Relationships are being renewed. Masks are now optional giving us a chance to see faces again (or for the first time!). Life is returning to a sense of normal. People are emerging from their cocoons. Wings are spreading and the darkness is lifting!

All this is happening as we prepare to celebrate Easter—a season of hope and new life. In 1 Peter 1:3 we read, “Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.” Spring is a time of rebirth and new birth. Easter, like spring, promises us new life and new beginnings. It is a time to move forward and shed ways and outlooks that may hold us back.

Easter reminds us that all things are possible with God (Matthew 19:26). The resurrection of Jesus from the dead offers us hope in a time of pandemic or of war. Our prayers ascend to God as we watch the news about destruction and death in Ukraine. We pray for the victims and their families. We pray for help for the refugees. We pray

for peace and healing of a country devastated and for a world that has been changed. Now more than ever, we need the promise of Easter and the power of the Holy Spirit to bring new life and hope to the people of Ukraine and to all living in fear.

WAR AND FAITH

War is hard. From the unnecessary bloodshed to the parents who will lose sleep and children from the violence, it can be difficult to process the gravity of all that is happening. And yet, I believe it is important as followers of Christ to not look away at the suffering that is happening in Ukraine.

It has been roughly over a month since the first news broke about the situation happening to our siblings in Ukraine. As Russian invaders descended upon the country, we have seen a flurry of articles about the resolve and the constitution of the Ukrainian people which many have looked at with admiration. Amidst the headlines, we have seen photos and video of people huddled in bunkers, finding ways to share hope despite being under bombardment and other aggression.

Perhaps my favorite photos and footage I've seen has been a number of Ukrainian clergy who are holding Eucharist and other church services despite being holed up in shelters while they are weathering the storm of war. Can you imagine attending a church service while bullets and bombs are flying overhead? I know many of you have military service so this might be a foreign concept but I think that many who have not been at the frontlines consider this a very surreal experience.

"There is no such thing as a good war and no such thing as bad peace" is a quote made by Benjamin Franklin during the 1783 treaty of Paris. As Christians, we might be invited into deeper reflection on this as the war continues in Ukraine. What does it mean for us to be faithful to God and our humanity during war? How are we praying for our "enemies" both abroad and in our daily lives?

War is hard and it is never good. People will be hurt and there will be death. In following Christ, we must work towards peace, no matter how small. When we aspire and work towards peace then we work towards uniting the divide between the children of God.

### *Daughters of the King Day*

Back in April of 1885 a woman named Margaret Franklin envisioned a religious order for Episcopal lay women based on vows of prayer, service, and evangelism—and the Order of the Daughters of the King was born. This year the Order is celebrating its 167th anniversary. From the original chapter in New York City it has grown to hundreds of chapters through-out the United States, in Africa, Asia, Europe, Central and South America, and the Caribbean. Our chapter here at St. Francis—the St. Clare Chapter—has over 30 members, as well as a sister chapter—Dew of the Angels—in Bananera, Guatemala. To celebrate this anniversary, Fr. Warren has designated Sunday, April 3 as ‘Daughters of the King’ Day. Please join us in the Parish Hall after the Sunday service for cake and information about the Order.

The mission of the Daughters (or DOK, as it is often called) is to be the extension of Christ’s kingdom throughout the world, through prayer, service, and evangelism. As Daughters, we undertake a Rule of Life, which encompasses a Rule of Prayer and a Rule of Service—daily prayer for the Church, the spread of Christ’s kingdom, for our members, chapter and clergy, and for those who have asked for our prayers. The Rule of Service is composed of service by the chapter as a whole (our prayer quilt ministry, for example) and those forms of service undertaken by each individual Daughter.

To become a member, a woman participates in a 12-session study of DOK history, the Rules of the Order, and spiritual reflection, after which she may take her life-long vows. Any woman in the parish who would like to learn more about the Daughters of the King is welcome to attend any of our chapter meetings held from 9:45 to 11 AM in the Vulliamy Room on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of each month, or talk to any one of us—you’ll recognize us by the distinctive cross we each wear! *Judy Turberg*

A donor-paid arborist is completing corrective pruning and fertilizing of the four live oak trees in the Courtyard. Four ailing and encroaching palo verde trees and some mistletoe in several trees will also be removed by a landscape contractor.

Because of a generous donation, a landscape designer has been commissioned to develop a design suggesting other possibilities for enhancing our desert property. This proposed design will be reviewed in conjunction with the 5-year landscape and grounds planning effort of the Church's grounds and landscape team. A report will be provided to the Vestry.

About 20 volunteers met on March 18 to contribute their time and talent to a spring, grounds cleanup. Mark and Sandy Eckstein provided a yum-

## The Watch

"Come Watch With Me, Pray With Me, and Do Not Be Afraid"

After the Maundy Thursday Eucharist, the Sacrament is taken in solemn procession to the Altar of Repose, a free-standing altar in the Chapel, and a vigil is kept.

At the Altar of Repose, parishioners keep vigil in silent prayer and adoration, recalling our Lord's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane and his rebuke to his disciples: "What? Could you not watch one hour with me?" Those keeping vigil at the Altar of Repose further recall and respond to Jesus' admonition to his disciples to stay awake to pray with him until the Roman soldiers come to arrest and imprison him. The vigil will conclude prior to the Good Friday Service.

Deacon Becky will have a signup sheet for the Vigil starting today, Sunday, April 3. Reading material, prayers, poetry will be provided or just sit with Jesus for one hour.

## Exploring the Life and Thought of C.S. Lewis

Clive Staples Lewis was arguably the greatest Christian apologist—as in ‘one who speaks or writes in defense of someone or something’—of the twentieth century. (His books and essays are admired across denominational lines in the twenty-first century too.) Lewis tackled many of the teachings of the church which trouble, or at least tend to puzzle, contemporary Christians; he approaches them with clarity and a genuine interest in making them not only understandable, but also a solid foundation upon which to build a lasting faith. Lewis brings to his apologetic work the same depth of understanding and deftness of thought he exhibits in his celebrated work as a scholar.
