#### Words From Warren . . .

Dear friends.

You should be receiving this newsletter during Holy Week. With that in mind, I want to speak about the special role Holy Week plays for us as we prepare to celebrate Easter.

Depending on the church denomination you worshipped in growing up, Holy Week may or may not have been an important part of your faith experience. I invite you to come and worship, pray and reflect, on the last days of Jesus throughout Holy Week.

Holy Week is for me an important part of entering into the experience and love of Jesus, laying out the context that leads to His sacrifice on the Cross, and then to enter into the mystery and power of Easter Sunday.

Holy Week is full with rich images that continue after Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Jesus wept over Jerusalem, and then entered the Holy City knowing the Cross was just days away. Holy Week is a window into how political and religious forces clash with Jesus and plot His death.

Each day in Holy Week offers us a real-time glimpse into Jesus' final days including how Jesus continues to prepare His disciples for what is to come. In His final hours, Jesus teaches His disciples about Love through service to others.

On Maundy Thursday, we read in John 13, that Jesus gets down on His knees and lovingly washes the feet of His Disciples, even the one who was to betray Him, giving a New Commandment to love one another as He loved us.

The Gospel story then continues with the breaking of bread and sharing the cup of wine during a Passover meal, a meal that retells the story of God's power and salvation for God's people. This Last Supper of Jesus becomes for us a sustaining Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, the Great Thanksgiv-

ing—The Eucharist: A meal of inclusion, healing and forgiveness.

The story then moves quickly from the meal to prayer and betraval in the Garden of Gethsemane, the fleeing of Jesus' disciples, a Roman trial, the brutality of the Cross, death, and the darkness of the tomb. An overwhelming grief was felt by all who loved Iesus, a grief that pierced the heart of Mary, the mother of Jesus, just as Simeon predicted when he held the infant Jesus in his arms in Luke 2:34-35.

Holy Week helps us to understand how the joy of Palm Sunday led to the Cross, inviting us to enter into the daily experiences of Jesus and His disciples. Take time to read one or all of the Gospels and follow Jesus from the Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem (Mt 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-44 or John 12:12-19) through the events of the week.

Beginning on April 2, Palm Sunday at 4 PM, we will start Holy Week with a special Taizé Prayer service in the Chapel. Taizé is a beautiful service with icons, candles, and chanting music. Come and bring a friend.

Journey with us through the week. Experience the Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday with the lighting of the Easter fire.

The Chapel will remain set up and open on Holy Monday and Holy Tuesday from 9 AM until NOON for private devotions and prayers.

Please see the list of other service times and days on the left side of the front page of the newsletter. Don't forget to bring the nails given out on the First Sunday in Lent on Good Friday.

May Holy Week be a special and holy time for you as you prepare to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday, April 9.

# Franciscan Focus St. Francis and the Fifth Crusade Peace and Justice Part 1

After Pope Honorius III in 1217 called for a Christian Crusade in Egypt, Francis felt it was urgent for him go there to convert Muslims and to preach to wayward Christians in the Crusader camp. His method was not to convert Muslims by force and coercion or doomsday warnings, but rather to preach and proclaim the word of Christ, much as he had already been doing.

After Francis had made his decision to go to Egypt he was accompanied by a dozen of his 'brothers,' one of whom was Illuminatus, chosen perhaps for his rudimentary ability to express himself in Arabic.

Francis, Illuminatus and the other brothers boarded a ship, first to Syria, and later to Egypt on a voyage which would last nearly six weeks. During that whole voyage they were surrounded by thieves and murderers who were joining the Crusaders in the hope of earning the Pope's forgiveness.

Upon finally arriving in Egypt, late in 1218, Francis witnessed the horrible living conditions in the Crusaders' camp. Living in the camp were criminals of various sorts, as well as harlots. Crusaders were dying from dysentery and hunger, others were being executed for trying to survive by stealing food and water. The heat and drenching humidity and decaying corpses floating down the Nile made living there beastly awful. Furthermore, the military situation among the Christian Crusaders at that moment was desperate due largely to the Pope's replacement of a competent military commander, John of Brienne, with Cardinal Pelagio, a man totally unfit by temperament and competence to lead the Crusade.

The conditions among the Muslims in Damietta, on the other hand, were more favorable upon Francis' arrival in several respects: better morale, better equipment and an abundance of victuals. The Muslim fortification wall surrounding Damietta was formidable and more than sufficient to withstand the projectiles of javelins and stones launched by the Crusader artillery. When those objects failed to destroy the wall, the Christians had used ladders to scale the wall, only to receive severe beatings when they got to the top or boiling oil poured on them

as they ascended. Even worse, during one siege, the Crusaders had been informed that the Sultan had abandoned Damietta and fled into the desert. Eagerly, they pursued him only to find out that most of the Muslim army was hiding in the sand dunes. The Muslim trap worked and the Crusaders were massacred, losing almost 6,000 soldiers.

As bad as the overall situation was for the Christians, Pelagio rejected several very generous offers of peace by the Sultan. In more than one instance, the Sultan actually tried to prevent further bloodshed by offering generous concessions, such as a 30 year truce, relics from the true cross and even the kingdom of Jerusalem itself, if the Christians would leave Egypt. Instead, Pelagio refused these peace overtures and continued later to attack the fortifications, suffering a huge number of casualties with no success. Military morale among the Christians was disintegrating and many soldiers deserted.

Why did Pelagio refused all such peace offers? He thought he could win all the Sultan's concessions in battle, and in so doing support the Italian merchants who wanted to continue their profitable trade in Egypt. He also knew that if he succeeded militarily it meant that it would cut off Egypt from Palestine and the Arab supply lines to the Egyptian wheat fields. This would then put pressure on the Arabs to surrender Jerusalem unilaterally.

In our next Newsletter, Francis seeks peace and justice in his visit with the Sultan.

#### Junior Warden's Notes

- 1. Matt and Nathaniel are reorganizing the two sexton rooms. The back room is now a repainted, computerized office, and the front room is more for storage of supplies. Stay tuned!
- 2. Susan Burch and Jon Nichols are leading the development of what will be known as the St. Francis Green Team. This initiative is seeking interested members. Find the Green Team table after Sunday services. The initial effort is to evaluate and boost recycling efforts with appropriate containers.
- 3. We continue to investigate, study blueprints—thank you Jack Gardner, and seek a real solution to achieve consistent comfort for the Parish Choir and reduce the costs of inconsistent temperature control. Thank you, Matt Harby, Lead Sexton, for your mechanical expertise!
- 4. A successful, grounds/landscape work party on March 16 moved almost 6 tons of gravel across the front yard of the Church for erosion control and improvement of the overall appearance of our property. Thank you, Susan Burch, Jon Nichols, Harvey Eaves, Geoffrey Hill, Chris Arundell, Gary La Barre, Craig Reid, and Reg Kahrimanis.

- 5. Lighting: Matt, Lead Sexton, has assessed every light inside and outside the Church campus. He has cleaned up and replaced many. Enjoy the wonderful lights again on the Rose window in the choir loft; the multiple lights along the south stairs entering the choir loft; and the steps leading from the west parking area to the lower level on the south end of the property. One more light has been added to the track above the Chapel altar for better lighting to the left of the altar and columbarium area. Lighting on the exterior of the Boutique is being repaired. The lighting at the main entrance into the narthex is restored. And much more! Thank you, Matt!
- 6. The flat roof replacement project is mostly complete. We have had the company return to correct leaking into light fixtures in the meeting rooms and to clean up debris. When the final work is done to our satisfaction, the last half of the payment (\$24,900) will be paid from roof damage insurance money.
- 7. The weed crop this year is widespread. Craig has done a great job of spraying the main property. Anyone who would like to spend time removing weeds on an area of grounds, please consider. Tools are in the tool room and accessible through the lead sexton. Small garbage cans on wheels found in the trash enclosure near employee parking can accommodate the weed debris. A D-hoe works well! Thank you in advance!
- 8. The Vestry approved two capital improvement projects in March: 1. This is the removal and replacement of carpet with new carpet in the Parish Hall, the hall by the meeting rooms and library, the hall by the office bathrooms, the front 2/3 of the office workroom, Madeleine's Room, and the reception office for a cost of \$22,800. This project's funding is \$13,931 awarded by the St. Francis Trust for the Parish Hall carpet, and the remaining \$8,872 is from a Church bequest for capital improvements. The tentative start date is after Easter; and, 2. Bates Paving and Sealing will replace pavement and repaint markings tentatively after April 9. The project covers the employee and handicapped parking areas (lower level) and is funded by \$20,000 from the St. Francis Trust and the remaining \$4,110 from insurance payments to the Church.
- 9. The locking mechanisms of two Parish Hall entrance doors, one handicapped accessible, have

been replaced for ease of locking, unlocking, and continued security.

- 10. To improve the lighting in the choir loft, all bulbs in the choir loft have been replaced with appropriate LEDs.
- 11. The gift of money from the Memorial Committee has allowed the purchase of a three-tiered fountain. It replaces the now removed, deteriorated metal fountain at the east entrance of the Courtyard. The new fountain tiers are now planted with cactus and succulents. You will not only see a small statue of St. Francis of Assisi in the top tier, but you may find some St. F. friends!
- 12. The oak topper for the sound booth in the Church continues to be admired. Thanks to the excellent work of Jim Ratley! And, thank you, Matt, and Nathaniel, for repainting the underside of the sound booth.
- 13. While doing its annual termite check, Rick's Pest Control discovered termites near the AED and first aid kit in the Parish Hall. They will be treated March 14.
- 14. The latching, metal gates for the entrances into the Courtyard are scheduled for installation on March 24. Welcome signs will be affixed to both sets of gates as well as generic plaques thanking parishioners for their donations for the gates. Another sign will show the purpose of the gates as barriers to the many javelina that visit at various times of day. They are easily latched gates like people have on most home gates.
- 15. With more people wearing hearing aids and an increasing number of audio presentations and activities in the Parish Hall (PH), consideration is being given to the potential replacement of the PH amplifier with induction loop capability that is damaged and needs repair. We will be exploring further whether, 1. This type of hearing enhancement is worth the money, and 2. The answer about how many people would benefit from this is substantial, and lastly, 3. There is a less expensive and more appropriate technology that would benefit more parishioners. So far, we have learned that some peoples' aids can link into the PA system, because their aids have the necessary t-coil, while others are upgrading to Bluetooth and wi-fi hearing components. Stay tuned!

### Hearts & Hands

The Hearts and Hands Ministry for April is backpacks for children attending Camp Genesis at Chapel Rock. To qualify for the camp the camper must have an incarcerated immediate family member (not just women in Perryville). This is a week of fun activities for the campers with similar family situations. If you would like to participate in providing backpacks, you can write a check to St. Francis then write the "Camp Genesis" in the memo line. You can put your check into the offering basket on Sunday, mail it to the church or take it in to the office. The backpacks will be filled on May 1.

Multiple things happen with your gift. First, you will receive credit for your tax purposes. Second, St. Francis will not have to pay the Diocesan assessment on this contribution as long as you designate your gift to "Camp Genesis". And third, and most importantly, the children will receive a backpack at summer camp.

Items for the backpacks can also be purchased from Amazon Wish List for the backpacks by scanning the QR code on the flyer available at the Prison Ministry table in the parish hall during coffee hour.

Story: There are 28 people in our parish who are praying for an individual Camp Genesis camper. Each person has a laminated heart with their camper's name imprinted on it. Those imprinted hearts, along with a pledge card signed by the person who had been praying for them everyday for a year, are placed in that camper's backpack - or sent to them, if they do not attend this years camp. Last year, when the campers opened their backpacks and found the card, with their own name on the heart, many weeped and many others smiled because they realized that someone thought about them every day.

## The Watch

After the Maundy Thursday Eucharist, the Sacrament is taken in solemn procession to the Altar of Repose, a free-standing altar in the Chapel, and a vigil is kept.

At the Altar of Repose, parishioners keep vigil in silent prayer and adoration, recalling our Lord's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane and his rebuke to his disciples: "What? Could you not watch one hour with me?" Those keeping vigil at the Altar of Repose further recall and respond to Jesus' admonition to his disciples to stay awake to pray with him until the Roman soldiers come to arrest and imprison him. The vigil will conclude prior to the Good Friday Service.

Deacon Becky will have a signup sheet for the Vigil starting Sunday, April 2. Reading material, prayers, poetry will be provided or just sit with Jesus for one hour.


