From Our Curate, The Rev. Nelson Mendoza "That Time of Year"

Advent and Christmas are my most favorite time of the year. My growing collection of "Ugly Christmas Sweaters" (and now Christmas-themed face masks) will affirm that statement. In addition, the front porch of my home has had Christmas lights and décor up since the first of November so my apologies to the "Advent police" out there but this year I'm seeking new ways to create and find joy.

I recently saw a Christmas advertisement from Disney for this year and I was moved to tears. If you do a simple Google search for "Disney 2020 Christmas Advert" it should be the first YouTube video that pops up but if you don't have the ability I will describe it for you: A young girl meets her grandfather in a crowded Filipino city set in 1940. She greets him in the traditional Filipino custom of "mano po" which is when a younger person receives an elder's hand and takes the back of their hand to their forehead. This is a sign of respect and often seen at Filipino gatherings. From there, the grandfather gives the little girl a Mickey Mouse stuffed toy. Flash forward to 2005 and we see that the little girl is now a grandmother has a granddaughter of her own. She gifts her granddaughter that same stuffed

toy that her grandfather had given her, and they spend a few moments sharing traditional Filipino Christmas traditions. Senior Warden's Notes

A few thoughts concerning these past twelve months I would like to share with you...

A "New Chapter" opened for St. Francis last month with the arrival of The Rev. Dr. Warren Leibovitch from the broad reaches of Ontario, Canada, where he served as Rector of St. Paul's, in Lindsay, Ontario.

Prior to accepting our call to become our new "shepherd" here at St. Francis, Fr. Warren, as he prefers to be addressed, completed the academic requirements for his Doctor of Ministry in Education through the Virginia Theological Seminary and, prior to that, a master's degree in Theology, and a master's degree in Divinity at Trinity College and St. Michael's College respectively. All of this was taking place while he was serving a variety of parishes as Rector, Vicar, and Priest-in-Charge. We can look forward to Fr. Warren sharing many of the results of his academic accomplishments with us in years to come.

One need only to stroll over to the Parish Hall to view a pictorial history of our church and to see the familiar faces of those who have served as spiritual leaders over the nearly 60 years our parish has existed. And you will soon see his picture prominently displayed as currently serving St. Francis.

One can only imagine the excitement late last year, when it was learned the search committee's choice had been approved by the Vestry, and the Senior Warden's subsequent phone call to the Bishop's office came back with her approval, followed by Bishop Jennifer's call to Fr. Warren to confirm if he in fact would be accepting the call to come and serve as St. Francis' rector.

The search process was finally ended, and the imaginary time lines were bouncing off the walls with everyone offering up their best estimate as to when Fr. Warren would be arriving from Canada to take possession of the Rector' office. Your rector, My rector, Our rector, was finally coming to Green Valley to be St. Francis' new spiritual leader.

My thoughts drifted back to what I had been taught to believe some forty years earlier, when I served as chair of the rector search committee at All Saints Episcopal Church in Appleton, Wisconsin, and that is that the rector you are searching for is out there, you just have to identify him/her. And when you have made the decision as who that

candidate might be, you confirm your identification and nurture the candidate; then with your Bishop's blessing/approval you make the call, and they will accept your Vestry's call.

I rediscovered this lesson some twenty years later when I served on the search committee for the new Bishop of the Diocese of Eau Claire, Wisconsin. Many of the factors involved in the local parish level of the search process were later identified for me as being identical at the diocesan level. In that particular situation, the new Bishop was out there, and he just needed to be identified.

But how were we to know what would be on our plates for most of the next year following Fr. Warren's acceptance of our call? We were under the assumption that Fr. Warren would be joining us here in Green Valley shortly after the first of the year, thus allowing him to remain in Lindsay and lead the celebration of the rapidly approaching Christmas season with the members of St. Paul's. After all, he had served the parish there for the previous 12 years.

This quickly turned into a false assumption as we were now facing some international issues involving the task of getting a visa approved for someone residing outside the U.S.—specifically a Canadian—and was becoming a matter a few of us felt required a legal adviser, one well-versed in immigration law; we accepted the services of an attorney in Tucson, who came to our attention through his current work with Imago Dei Middle School.

Of course the introduction of the Corona Virus and the subsequent pandemic crisis created a whole new set of concerns and problems. Something totally unexpected!

While it may be difficult to measure results achieved vs efforts actively pursued, everyone involved in monitoring the situation has done so with the patience of Job. Many spoke of first seeing the faintest of light at the end of the tunnel to finding their light at the same focal point growing brighter, or perhaps in a slightly different tunnel, and each personal experience showed with varying degrees of brightness, intensity, and clarity, drawing our attention to the fact that we were making progress.

We stayed the course, made an excellent choice in selecting The Rev. Canon Colville Smythe our Interim Rector, who served St. Francis for a full twenty-two (22) months. Our Vestry was faithful to their duties, while our various ministries continued to function flawlessly. Anytime a parish is to find itself intentionally or unintentionally without its priest and spiritual leadership, this will be the time you discover the multitude of strengths in residence waiting to be unleashed and put into action. It's a learning experience and a growing experience, helping you to prepare for the arrival of your new priest and spiritual leader.

We return next month with our sixth installment of significant naval leaders who are looked upon as "leaders of men." Stay tuned.

Journeying the Way of Love ADVENT CURRICULUM


For the season of Advent, Journeying the Way of Love offers four sessions to be explored as we await the coming of Christ by moving through the first two chapters of the Gospel of Luke.
