*Words from Fr. Nelson ...*

BLUE CHRISTMAS

It was December 2019 and I had just finished writing for my midterm exams while I was in seminary. At this time in my academic career, I had developed a tradition of completing my essays and tasks before the rest of the campus. This was because many of my seminarian compatriots became rampaging balls of anxiety and scholarly dread so my goal of completing my tests before them was something that brought me comfort.

This particular year, I was especially excited because as a treat for myself I had purchased tickets to Disney World and would spend the week at the most magical place on Earth. So, while my classmates were worrying, procrastinating, and writing their hearts out, I was already finished and enjoying a magical holiday with Mickey.

Fast forward a few months later and we would all begin hearing whisperings of a virus that was making its rounds. In fact, I traveled a few more times in February and March before the “new reality” of the pandemic began causing shutdowns and closures.

Do you ever think back to times when you were blissfully unaware of an event that was about to happen? For me it was that time romping around the Magic Kingdom or watching the Lion King in Animal Kingdom. Admittedly, it was those memories that got me through some of the darkest parts of the pandemic.

In thinking about last year, December 2020, it was a stark contrast to the December and holiday season I experienced the year prior. Admittedly, as a young clergy person with no family or friends in the area, the time here during a global pandemic has been incredibly challenging. ing the holidays. In December 2021, we have other unique challenges. How do we celebrate the “most wonderful time of the year” when the past 20+ months have not been a walk in a theme park? Despite decking the halls, baking all the goodies, and blasting Christmas music it might still feel impossible to tune out the heartbreaks of the past year or beyond.

And that’s where “Blue Christmas” comes in. For us, in particular, our Blue Christmas service is a safe space and time to remember, reflect, and cry during a season where everyone tells us we should be merry and bright. For me, it is a healing time to encounter things like grief, depression, job loss, role loss, divorce, and other things that we have lost. It’s a time of great dissonance and it is challenging to feel like we have to put on a happy face during the holidays. However, this service gives you permission to name your feelings, to think about them, and to grieve whatever it is you are missing.

The idea of Blue Christmas is to acknowledge the darkness, and let it be dark. Sometimes the service is referred to as the “Longest Night,” and I think it is important to remember that in our Christian tradition we are called to engage with our suffering just as Jesus encourages us to meet suffering where we encounter it. Sometimes we encounter suffering in others and sometimes we don’t need to look further than our own hearts and minds.

As this season approaches, consider reflecting on the things that you have lost in the past year or more. Are there ways you can encounter that suffering that might bring a different sense of curiosity in you and your relationship with God? Or perhaps, is simply acknowledging or sitting in silence with loss all you can muster?

No matter your response, know that your joys and suffering are meaningful to God and that you are allowed to be gentle with yourself.

### *Looking for a good book to read?*

In the midst of the hustle and bustle of the holidays when we might be too busy to even think about reading, Albert Holtz, O.S.B. offers us a way to connect the holidays to the quiet, patient, waiting holy days of Advent and the joy of Christmas in his book, *FROM HOLIDAYS TO HOLY DAYS: A Benedictine Walk Through Advent*. The book is a series of brief, daily meditations based on Brother Albert’s walks around his hometown of Newark, New Jersey, where he is a Benedictine monk at Newark Abbey. As he looks at familiar aspects of the holidays on his walks, such as putting up lights, Christmas presents, traffic jams, and holiday cooking, Brother Albert offers a reflection, a quotation from Sacred Scripture, and a passage from the Rule of Benedict or some other early monastic source. The reader is guided to connect the secular with the sacred, the ordinary with the divine. You can check out *FROM HOLIDAYS TO HOLY DAYS* at the Library Cart on Sunday during Coffee Hour after church.

## Junior Warden's Notes

I hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving holiday! And, the Christmas season is fast approaching.

Meanwhile, work continues on the grounds and in and around the building and spaces.

## GROUNDS

1. The extensive clean-up of our grounds by a local landscape company was completed on November 9 and 10. Removed were overgrown, dead, and dying agave, cacti, and shrubs as well as a palm that was encroaching into the blacktop of the back parking lot.

2. To supplement the year round work of the volunteer grounds team, spring and fall grounds cleanups by a select landscape/maintenance company are being addressed in the 2022 building and grounds budget proposal.

3. 4. Critter Control Company continues to come monthly to reset rat bait boxes around the outside of our buildings and on the grounds and also clean-up around them. A November 18 monthly report from them stated, "Arrived on site for bait station inspection and clean up. Today's activity was heaviest on the southwest corner with that station being completely empty. I did not see any increases in digging or anything in that area and I'm not sure why that one was heaviest but it was. Activity on the east side has improved vastly with the removal of those rat nests and cactus. Northside still had an average of about 40% of the bait missing. All bait was replaced throughout the property as needed. A few new holes were treated here and there, with the majority being in the center of the south side and also the northeast corner."

5. Kudos to volunteer parishioners and sextons, who rain or shine (mostly shine!), continue to work diligently and tirelessly on Church grounds. All of our regular and occasional ground volunteers are awe-inspiring and appreciated! Note a separate article about the recognition of grounds volunteers on November 14 followed by a lovely reception in the Memorial Garden. 6. Lastly, several evacuated bird nests have been removed around the campus and no-roosting materials inserted.

## BUILDINGS AND SPACES

1. Thank you to all for helping keep doors into our buildings closed unless otherwise designated, like before and after services and group gatherings in the Parish Hall.

2. The number of groups, small and large, requesting and using our spaces like the Parish Hall, classrooms, and Vulliamy Room, is increasing; thus, an increased percentage of our lead sexton and sexton's time is used for setting up tables and chairs, making coffee and lemonade, cleaning, sanitizing, and putting furniture away or back in place. Coordination of groups' requests also adds time.

3. The Library and Resource Room now has two, newly painted, light blue walls as part of its exciting renovation. Thank you, Deana, Lead Sexton.

4. The tool storage area and workshop are being reorganized. Tools and equipment are being secured. Watch for posted signage and a sign-out procedure for borrowing tools and equipment. Mostly, the grounds team members need to have certain items available to do the work they come to the Church to do. Thanks to Deana, Lead Sexton and Craig Reid, Main grounds volunteer, for their work on this project.

5. A fire marshal inspection recently pointed out the need to replace some malfunctioning exit and alarm signs. These are now being replaced for everyone's safety.

6. The timers for the bell tower lights and elsewhere have been inspected, replaced as needed, and reset. Check out the bell tower after dark. The light emitting through the stained glass is beautiful!

7. The roofing company tells us they are on track with the necessary materials to begin the tile roof replacements on January 3. We will be meeting with the site supervisor soon to work out the logistics and setup collaborative communication before, during, and after the project.

8. The commercial kitchen in the Parish Hall has been cleaned; our failing vacuum has been replaced!

9. At this time, no more bats are inside the Church; many roosting behind the Stations of the Cross in the Courtyard have apparently migrated per the noted reduction in droppings.

10. An upholstery cleaning company will soon be on our campus to clean our stained and soiled upholstered and frequently used chairs in the Parish Hall and in the Vulliamy Room.

11. To improve the security of our buildings and spaces, knowing that our office closes mid-day but still multiple groups reserve meeting room spaces anywhere from 8 AM through 8:30 at night, we are adding code locks to the Vulliamy Room door and to one of the two doors allowing entrance to the meeting rooms in the office complex. Groups who reserve these spaces will access the rooms using codes we have assigned them rather than having off duty sextons return to the Church to unlock doors and relock after groups leave.

### GENERAL

1. We are generating projected building and ground cost estimates for the Church's 2022 budget.

2. We plan to inquire at Pima County about an American Disability Act review for our campus.

### *Saturday Worship*

Over the next few months we will continue to tweak and improve the service such as the visibility of the power point presentation. I am interested in hearing what songs/hymns you may like to hear. I am also interested in expanding our vocal and instrumental group. If you can sing or play an instrument, please let me know.
