The Epistle

A Reading from the First Letter of Peter (2:19-25)

It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

"He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth."

When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John (10:1-10).

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. Food Bank Ministry Another Hearts & Hands Ministry

We at St. Francis collect nonperishable food for food banks all year. You can deposit your nonperishable food donations in the box outside the St. Francis Parish Hall.

In addition, the Sahuarita Food Bank on La Cañada Drive—next to the Good Shepherd Church—collects cardboard. The Food Bank bundles the cardboard, brings the bundles to a recycling facility, and receives money for each bundle. If you would like to help, you can deposit your cardboard at the southwest corner of the Sahuarita Food Bank on La Cañada Drive. The "cardboard box receptacle" is in front of the metal doors that hide trash. What an easy way to recycle our cardboard AND help the Food Bank.

If you would like to donate money to the food bank, you can write a check to St. Francis with 'Food Bank' in the memo line. You can put your check into the offering basket on Sunday, mail it to the church or take it in to the Parish Office.

Organ Preludes & Postludes

If you've ever wondered why the titles of some organ pieces—like our postlude this morning—begin with 'voluntary on...' it's because—in days of yore—the organist was expected to play pieces before the service (prelude) and after the service (postlude) voluntarily, that is, without pay. (I know you think I'm making this up, but it's actually true.) Of course, as you might expect, it's easy to conclude listening too was (and is) a voluntary act. In our day organ preludes and postludes are considered to be liturgical music, carefully chosen and integral to the service; a part of it, not something 'appended' and played by the organist voluntarily. For many people the organ prelude—especially the prelude—is an important part of their preparation for worship and they appreciate being able to hear it without having to contend with others talking during it. Please be courteous to your fellow worshippers who would like to listen to the music played on the organ. (The organist gets paid whether or not anyone listens; the old 'voluntary' days are a thing of the past.) Gerald
