## Senior Warden's Notes

Just as I promised folks, here is the 6th chapter in our series on the ten most influential naval leaders as we continue to investigate the contributions they provided by way of the leadership examples they developed and lived by during their naval careers. Our reference for this series is Admiral James Stavridis' book titled *SAILING TRUE NORTH: Ten Admirals and the Voyage of Character*. It is with this knowledge that we might use these same characteristics of time-tested leadership principles in our own quest to develop the future leaders of our Parish.

This month we will be visiting the life and times of Admiral Lord John Arbuthnot Fisher, born in Ceylon in 1841 and dying in London in 1920. In his closing comments Admiral Stavridis adds that "if I could pick only one admiral to spend an evening with, it would be Jacky Fisher," the same Lord John Arbuthnot Fisher. "That combination of relentless perseverance and an unbounded desire to "seize the new" is very, very rare in leaders."

Born to a middle-class culture in Ceylon in 1841, he became part of a large family totaling eleven children, of which only seven survived infancy. Due to the financial crisis that family was rapidly approaching, Jackie Fisher was shipped over to his paternal grandparents in England at the young age of six, and he never saw his parents again; they both died a few years later. And what was found to be so unusual about Fisher was that his seniors above himself, his peers, and even himself, that all would agree that Fisher had very little going for him. Over the years Fisher became recognized as one of the most undiplomatic leaders in military history. He would never forego an opportunity to publicly chastise a contemporary and was quick to formulate a long history of confrontation and argumentation.

He began his naval career at the age of thirteen as a young naval cadet, and soon thereafter while serving aboard HMS Calcutta, fainted on his first day of duty while witnessing the flogging of a half dozen sailors. Soon promoted to midshipman, he was assigned to Asia duty known as China Station, where he became recognized as an expert navigator.

Naval aristocracy was not young Fisher's place in life. To compete, he learned to fight, and was found often complaining about how much more money he could be earning working in the private sector.

Even today this is still a hot topic in every branch of service.

With his reputation as an outstanding navigator, he was given command of a steam powered paddle gunboat, and was soon recognized as having a knack for sea duty, and a kind of level and steady confidence with both superiors and subordinates. He was quickly becoming the Royal Navy's best known and most discussed officer of his generation.

As the American Civil War was unfolding, Jacky Fisher moved over to the Royal Navy's training base in Portsmouth, where he began to develop new weapon delivery systems, and later in 1863 returned to sea as a gunnery officer in the Royal Navy's first armored battleship, HMS Warrior.

By 1876, Fisher was promoted to the rank of full captain, and over the next five years held command of six different warships. While command of so many ships was not unheard of, the quantity of command experiences and the quality of results consistently delivered, prepared him for command of HMS Inflexible, the Royal Navy's newest and the best equipped in their fleet.

Fisher's success, and with his reputation surrounding him, he quickly became a polarizing figure earning significant and ongoing support from the royal family. Offsetting the frequent tours at sea, his periods ashore were punctuated with numerous opportunities to create innovative ideas in new ship design, notably the submarine, while pushing the arguments for the development of undersea weapons technology including most notably the role of the torpedo.

In 1903, Fisher assumed command of the growing Portsmouth Naval Base, along with Lord Nelson's HMS Victory as his flagship. To get there, he first designed and implemented a new curriculum for the training of both engineers and deck officers to include more science and technology. Throughout the fleet, his impact was debated, but the changes he brought about created new intellectual capital in the officers of the fleet to match the changes he instituted in the ships they were to man and operate.

As career officers we often think of innovation as improvements in physical systems and specific equipment. But in many ways the most important innovations in any enterprise are the changes we make in how we prepare human beings to perform. Fisher was the rare leader of his time who fully un-



derstood the need to do both.

In an era when most ship captains and admirals were content to promote routine maintenance efforts, Fisher demanded realistic and dangerous combat-oriented training, insisting on nighttime drills, the use of real explosives, long hours to simulate the stress of combat, and physical fitness training to ensure peak readiness. All of the advances he drove were additive and resulted in a far higher level of overall British naval mastery at sea.

Fisher later used his powerful reputation to drive the design of two important and truly modern classes of ships. The first was the all-big-gun battleship. The second class was the faster but more lightly armored battle cruisers. HMS Dreadnought was the lead ship of the new battleship class, while HMS Invincible was the lead battle cruiser, both ships joining the fleet in 1907.

At the start of the First World War, Fisher was brought back to a combatant's role by the young, headstrong Winston Churchill. Fisher and Churchill were perhaps too much alike, and the cooperative relationship didn't last long. The relationship deteriorated rapidly over legitimate differences in strategic considerations for how the fleet would be deployed. Fisher tore himself away from the negotiation table with a strained and angry look on his face.

Over the course of his final half decade from 1915 until his death in 1920, Fisher continued to fight for new naval ideas from a variety of public platforms. Fisher had a fine voyage through life, always fighting against the odds, and almost always winning. He created significant change and is remembered with great respect in the Royal Navy.

Humble beginnings and physical shortcomings were the very foundations of Jacky Fisher's character. Joining the British Admiralty ran through the family; both Jacky and a younger brother Frederic became admirals, and all three daughters married naval officers each of whom became an admiral, as did his only son.

The defining character conflict of Jacky Fisher's life was the struggle between his massive ego, and his sincere devotion to the Royal Navy. Meanwhile, he was learning that watching his physical health is an act of character and can help with his ability to perform. He also learned that the best end to a disagreement is the creation of a win-win outcome.

A tool to consider in this regard is meditation, or simply finding time to quietly think about life while listening to good music.

Closely associated with this is the quality of optimism. Fisher was relentlessly upbeat and positive. And then there was the questing and relentless mind, endlessly asking the question, "Why can't we do that?" So often, the most defining issue of character is curiosity. One thing that Fisher constantly taught his subordinates was the mind that gets into the habit of asking questions is the mind that will learn more, accomplish more, and be satisfied more.

Next month we will visit the life and times of The Admiral's Admiral, Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz.
