Remembering Madeline (again)

My article about former Parish Secretary and assistant organist Madeline Williams—published in the November 2022 issue of The Franciscan Staff—provoked a good deal of comment from many of you, so much that I think a little more of the story is in order; and there’s more to tell.

As it turns out, like many of you, my first experience of Madeline was at the Chapel entrance to the church on a Sunday morning. I was a visitor and Madeline was a greeter. I came away from that encounter thinking ‘what an extraordinary person.’

This was all long before I became associated with the parish as Director of Music. I didn’t remember, during the time in between, much of anything about that visit to St. Francis in the Valley, but I did remember Madeline.

There was nothing ordinary about Madeline. Hers was a big personality, but not in any sense an ‘in your face’ one. Madeline had been a public school teacher and there was a good deal of the ‘schoolmarm’ left over. I often felt that, unless I minded my ‘p’s and q’s,’ I would be on a trip to the principal’s office. But, even so, she was never overbearing. And that was because, I think, there was a sense of humor forever lurking in the background. (Maybe she was wondering why none of us had ever grown up: up, that is, to her standards of what it meant to be a ‘grown up.’)

Madeline was always elegantly attired. If there was a ‘casual’ Madeline, I never saw her. And she was in her way rather formal (nothing very casual there either). The very exuberant Madeline-the-Greeter was somewhat at odds with the poised and elegant Madeline-the-Parish Secretary. To my knowledge she never accepted personal invitations: dinner, lunch, partys, that sort of thing. She was a very private person. In spite of that, everyone who knew her thought of her as a friend—and a confidant too: someone in whom you felt you could safely confide.

Many years ago I received a postcard, mailed from Hong Kong, from a gentle lady I had had the great good fortune to get to know. She was traveling with a cousin (or sister, I’ve forgotten which) on the QE II and, along the way, died aboard ship. I got the postcard two weeks after she had been buried at sea.

Junior Warden's Notes

1. As of December 5, the Church has no employed sextons. Both Deana Bond, Lead Sexton, and Clarke Green, Sexton, resigned their positions. The Personnel Committee, Orji Isiogu, Chair, Father Warren, and Deb Harby, Finance Director/Office Manager are posting job announcements for Lead Sexton with a restructured, full time (32 hours with on call) job description and Seasonal-Part-time Sexton for 10-12 hours during the busy months of September-October through April-May. The main responsibilities of this position are setting up (and taking down) furniture for our multiple events and doing other miscellaneous tasks. During this transition, the office staff, Rector, multiple parishioners, and Junior Warden are fulfilling sexton responsibilities.

2. On December 7 our Church's American and Episcopal Church flags were lowered at half mast to honor lives lost on December 7, 1941, at Pearl Harbor in Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii.

3. Though not new, the central Courtyard is typi-

cally visited daily by roving javelina herds. They like the acorns produced by our three live oak trees. While visiting, they root up the soil at the base of the trees and leave droppings. All of this means more landscape work as well as cleanup, which translates to personnel time. Also, at times baby javelina accompany the adults. The parents are quite aggressive, if they have babies with them. Though javelina and other critters are part of the desert, some endanger not only parishioners but also many community groups that use our meeting rooms that regularly end at 9 PM or after.

4. The Church is accepting donations toward the purchase of already-designed wrought iron gates with dove and cross ornamentation that would provide latched barriers to javelina at both entrances into the Courtyard. Donations can be placed in the Sunday offering with designation to the gates, mailed to the Church, or delivered to the office. A poster in the Parish Hall explains this project in more detail; or, Kristi Menix, Junior Warden, can provide other information. Each of the three gates is \$1800. At this date, we thank those six individuals/couples who have donated a total of \$1300. No amount is too small. Thank you for your consideration.

5. The defunct light outside the south Chapel door entrance has been repaired with a light sensor, so that the adjacent sidewalk and entrance door are well lit for safety after dusk and until dawn.

6. The pole lights in the west parking lot are working well again. The timer was repaired as was the wiring in one of the poles. As the bulbs/lamps burn out, they will be replaced with LED lamps, which give a white glow rather than the yellow-tinged lighting of older bulbs.

7. The activation pads for the electric, automatic doors at north Church and south Chapel entrances have been repaired.

8. The cooling function of the HVAC system operated with the choir loft thermostat has been assessed due to recent poor cooling in the loft. The mechanical unit is leaking coolant. The cost of replacing the old coolant plus mechanical repairs may be less cost-effective than replacing the unit.

9. The Junior Warden has submitted the 2023 building and grounds budget proposal to the Church Treasurer.

10. The metal fountain at the east entrance of the Courtyard has been deemed beyond repair, because

of chronic leaks. We plan to replace it with a similar one while keeping the original donor plaque beside it. The Memorial and Gifts Ministry is assisting with this project.

11. The poorly functioning door entering the Parish Hall kitchen from the designated parking area has been refurbished to ensure appropriate function and security.

12. Four broken parking curbs have been replaced with new, concrete curbs; Felix Landscaping has also delivered 2 yards of base fill to the grounds near the back of the office buildings to build eroded areas back up.

13. Craig Reid and Reg Kahrmanis are coordinating teams of volunteer parishioners to continue establishing functional rock beds, the water collection pit, and trimming overgrown trees and shrubs. Thank you to all dedicated ground volunteers! Welcome Jon and Susan Burch, Harvey Eaves, and Steve Huhta to the ground team. Everything is looking great!

14. Thank you to Susanne Fairman for her recent donation of a new hand vacuum to the Church. We will put that to good use frequently.

15. Lastly, we are investigating a recent, large water usage bill for our complex via a data usage chart that the water company sent us. The source is yet unknown. We just know we have normal water usage now, which is about 7000 gallons per month.

Hoping everyone had a wonderful Advent and Christmas! Thank you for your interest in maintaining a safe, attractive, comfortable, and secure buildings and grounds.

Remembering Madeline (Again)

Receiving a postcard from someone who had been dead for two weeks is the sort of event one doesn't expect ever to be repeated in one's lifetime. Until Madeline. A few days after Madeline died I, along with many another of her friends and acquaintances, received a letter informing us that she, Madeline, was now in heaven and that she would be there to greet us upon our arrival—provided, of course, we didn't have to first stop off at the principal's office. But Madeline wasn't in any way a looney: she was simply a person in possession of an unshakable faith. She would be in heaven (already was) and would be there to greet me, and that was that. She didn't say anything, looked as she always had, wore a hat and carried a handbag.

An unforgettable character was Madeline Williams; unforgettable in the best sense. I don't know about the heaven thing, but who does? *Gerald*
