Outreach

THANK YOU FRIENDS. Your support of our OUTREACH projects through this very weird Covid time has been outstanding. Since we initiated the COMMUNITY FOOD BANK project you have donated more than 1181 pounds of goods and food for our neighbors in the Green Valley-Sahuarita community. First 128 pounds of peanut butter, then 390 pounds of pasta, beans and rice, 236 pounds of tuna, chicken and spam, 305 pounds of soup, fruit and veggies and then 122 pounds of diapers, wipes and baby food. Special thanks, as well, to the loyal Outreach folks who picked up and delivered all these treasures each Monday morning. Not only were we able to deliver food and diapers but we also, through your generosity, gave the Community Food Bank a check for \$1220 and sent 87 pounds of grapefruit to the Sahuarita Food Bank.

In addition to the Food Bank project we continued to deliver birthday gifts and clothing to the women at CASA PALOMA. We also delivered more than 100 backpacks to the children and their parents waiting for asylum at our border as well as hundreds of warm jackets, sweatshirts and sweaters. We contributed an entire truck load of school supplies to the CONTINENTAL SCHOOL.

At Christmas time we were able to give fifty kids each a \$50 gift card to make sure they each had a happy Christmas—that's \$2500. Add to this checks for \$250 each to the CROSSROADS MISSION for their Thanksgiving and Easter dinners.

Now the Outreach Committee looks forward to meeting together again in the fall to plan the 2021 and 2022 projects. We might not have been able to meet together or to worship our God in the sanctuary but, thanks to all of you and our hardworking committee, we were sure busy doing His work in the community.

ON MISSIONAL COMMUNITIES

The decision to start a conversation about mission with an established congregation often begins because someone has an idea. This idea is often born out of necessity and a reaction to seeing or experiencing some sort of injustice occurring in a community that is relevant in some aspect to the individual having the idea. From my experience in doing ministry, I've found that oftentimes the most "successful" mission projects begin because the person who is the catalyst for that missional idea is rather close to the cause. This manifests in various ways ranging from homelessness, working with undocumented immigrants, the LGBTQ community, and beyond.

At St. Francis, we have many passionate individuals with various interests. After mentioning all of the things above, I would say that the best way to start conversation about mission would be to take the "pulse" of church leadership and the individual(s) who are interested in beginning this new missional activity. This may start with an interest meeting or some sort of brainstorm. I think this is important because there have been many initiatives I have seen that were started but because the church in question was already depleted of resources, the mission ended up being unsustainable. If the church people and its leadership thinks this is something that there is enough energy and resources behind, then we begin an action plan that outlines some of the major steps needed for this missional project to be birthed, to operate, and to hopefully find a point of closure or sustainability.

And so, with Fr. Warren's leadership and the guidance of the vestry we will be looking to turn our gaze outwards into the community to listen to the needs and see how we can be better community neighbors for all of God's children.

The blueprint or plan should take into account things like not wanting to fix the target demographic or group that the mission is intending to work with. What this means is, while dreaming big dreams, not to assume the mission will end homelessness or hunger universally. I think it's important to stay practical and also to establish basic ideologies of

how the church will be working/serving **with** and not for the mission group.

It is easier to make a mission about a quick fix. But, if we lean into the discomfort of how ministry manifests in our lives, we recognize that it is more than handing someone a sandwich. It's about being with our neighbors and truly leaning into the uncomfortable.

That being said, consider this your invitation to look for ways to engage our efforts and actions outside of our immediate community in the coming months. This may look like service opportunities, volunteering, and worship. Either way, we can't do it without you and we would love for you to join us on this exciting adventure of living into our discipleship.

The Wonders of Digital Instruments

Much of what we hear these days when listening to popular music, or commercial music—the kind of stuff we hear in the background of television commercials—or even in film scores is produced, not by the playing of real (or *acoustic*) instruments, but through the playing of instruments created by means of digital sampling. Digital sampling is a way of recording the sound of someone playing every note of the entire compass of, say, a flute, and making it—the resulting recorded sound (or *sample*)—playable on a keyboard. Do that with all the instruments of the orchestra and, by means of computer programs that can put it all together, you can duplicate the sound of an orchestra. (This is admittedly, and at best, a sketchy explanation, but it will have to do for the moment.) Early attempts at this were easy to spot: they sounded only vaguely like an orchestra—more like an orchestra of toy instruments played by chimpanzees. The technique has advanced to the point where, nowadays however, it's difficult—even for musicians—to tell exactly what they're listening to.

One of the best examples of the successful use of digital sampling is the organ. Electronic 'organs' have been around for a long time, you may be quick to tell me; and so they have. The first Hammond organ was manufactured in 1935 and it's still used by pop music groups today, although in a somewhat refined version (it still sounds the same as it did in 1935). Attempts were made fairly early on to imitate the pipe organ (or 'church' organ) electronically, but with disappointing results (at least for organists who had to play them). Digital sampling changed all that, and for the better. Organists now can have at their fingertips the great German, French, and English classic instruments. If I'm willing to spend the money I can sit at home and play—through my own digital speakers—the organ in Westminster Abbey. (There's a YouTube video of a su-

Junior Warden's Notes

Timing is everything! You may have heard this common statement or used it yourself to explain the success or failure of some event or circumstance. In my report this expression certainly applies to the recent types of building and grounds needs and the stepping up of employees and volunteers doing good things just at the right time! Appreciation goes out to all!

Buildings (may be some duplication from prior reports)

1. *Parish Hall*: Tiling of the ceiling after demolition of old tiles, fixtures, and bulbs is near completion. Notice the new fixtures and LED lamps as well as tiles. The Vestry approved Green Valley Electric's fixture and LED costs. The lead sexton and assistants did the demolition, electrical prep, and replacement of tiles. (John Colip, Clark Green, Deana Bond). Left to do is carpet cleaning to make the Hall sparkle.

2. *Chapel*: The non-working amplifier that operates the induction loop capability of some hearing aids was evaluated. The wiring in the Chapel was the problem and is being remediated (Neal Hursh, OTOJOY, Green Valley Electric).

3. *Church Nave*: To enhance the lighting emitted from the large, wrought iron chandeliers and side wall sconces, CFL bulbs are being replaced by LED bulbs (John Colip, Deana Bond, Clark Green). Though back-ordered, the bulbs are due to arrive soon. It is believed that the buzzing noise experienced by people with hearing aids with induction loop capabilities may be reduced by using all LED bulbs.

4. *Reception Office*: Be pleasantly surprised at the transformation. A gently-used oak cabinet matching other furniture now houses the mailbox slots, provides storage space, and offers a writing surface. Wall art depicting the Church and the Southwest now grace the walls. Of special note is a newly-framed Prayer of St. Francis penned in calligraphy by the late Charlie Reppenhagen. It has been hung and greets all who enter this welcoming, reception space. (Susan Davis in collaboration with Father

Warren). The wall where the mailboxes were will soon be painted and other artwork hung.

Grounds

1. *Downspout Covers and Crosses*: After a number of reports of parishioners tripping on the gutter downspouts extending into the courtyard, wooden covers have been crafted, painted, and installed over them. (Craig Reid) (John Colip, Sue Whitney). Adding to the benefit of preventing trips and falls, these covers are being decorated with relevant crosses. Watch future newsletters and other spaces around the Church for descriptions and significances of each of the crosses. (Craig Reid).

2. *Overall Grounds Care and Support*: Drainage cleanup and weed control are items of activity as well as the gift of timely support to other volunteer parishioners. (Craig Reid). Special areas—Memorial Garden, the Labyrinth, Claire's Garden, and the Courtyard trees and plants—warrant more water and cleanup during the hotter summer months. (Reg Kahrimanis, Chris Arundell, Gary La Barre, Nancy Albin, Sue Whitney, Arlene Stremming, Joyce and Vince Remillard). A talented, former master gardener, also a parishioner, is working on site and design plans for potential development and care of these special areas. (Reg Kahrimanis). To make watering more effective and efficient, hoses on reels and multiple, 20-gallon watering bags, all donated, are being used.

Digital Instruments

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perb organist—Randall Mullin—playing my *Carillon on a Ukranian Carol* on one of the great French classic instruments; but he's in his own living room.) The cost of digital instruments, especially the organ, is but a fraction of the cost of a comparable pipe organ. Lest anyone think I'm promoting electronic substitutes over real, acoustic instruments, rest assured I'm not. As good as the digital instruments are (and I work with them all the time as a composer) the genuine article will always be better. That said, the digital substitutes make my life as a composer easier, even though I know the sound of the real thing will be better.

We have a digital organ at St. Francis and, thanks to the way it's installed (or the way it has been re-installed) the sound is amazingly good. Can you tell it's not a pipe organ? To the trained ear, yes.

The problem with technology is, of course, that it becomes outdated. Anyone who has had to buy a new computer to replace an old one knows what I mean. The organ also has physical components that simply wear out and, as is often the case, cannot be replaced. The organ here at St. Francis needs to be replaced. It is, essentially, a twenty year old computer, as Neal Hursh has reminded me. It still sounds pretty good (although the new technology and sampling is far better) but the physical components are wearing out.

We'll have more to say in the next Newsletter. Thanks for reading.

A Message From Your Vestry

At the June Vestry meeting, as one of the first parts of developing the Church's Emergency Preparedness Plan and protocol, the Vestry unanimously passed the following resolution:

•In accordance with Resolution #2012-D003 passed by the General Convention of the National Episcopal Church and adopted by the Episcopal Diocese of Arizona, St. Francis in the Valley Episcopal Church declares that St. Francis in the Valley Church and all Church property as a Gun Free and Weapons Free Zone.

The Vestry thoroughly discussed and carefully considered the various views on this issue over three meetings and it was felt that this decision was in accord with the Church continuing to be seen as a sacred and safe place—a sanctuary where people can come for prayer and healing.

Acknowledging that there are strong opinions with valid points on both sides of this issue, this policy will be implemented in the spirit of gaining cooperation and within the context of a total Emergency Preparedness Plan. More information and details will become available as we continue working on this Plan.

Your Vestry hopes and prays that all Church members will understand the need for a policy and respect the deliberations that brought it to adopt this provision in light of the National Church's and Arizona Diocese's guidance.
