I believe that going to a nursing school based at the hospital will help us not only graduate as well-educated Nurses, but as nurses with a strong character and an even stronger conviction to serve others in a selfless way as God would have us do, and as St. Francis and St. Clare would have done themselves.

▶ **NEW MINISTRY SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR OUR FUTURE LEADERS:** Joyce Davison has been working with the Kiwanis International Builders Club which teaches leadership skills to 6, 7 and 8th graders at the Continental Elementary School. She overheard teachers talking about buying supplies for their students with their own money and, therefore, a new Ministry is born. Joyce and Pat Peissig will set up an information table in the Parish Hall after Sunday Service from June 30 to July 28 with a list of supplies needed; she will also have a place to drop off your donation. Of course a money donation is always welcome—instructions for donations are below.

▶ **SISTER JOSE'S WOMEN'S SHELTER:** Sue Spiewak and Rena Robbins recently toured the Women's shelter in Tucson. They reported that the shelter can house up to 53 homeless women. Women not staying at the shelter can also go to the shelter to shower, wash their clothes and have a meal. They are in need of seasonal

clothes and sneakers as well as unused hotel size personal items. Money donations are always welcome—instructions for donations are below.

▶ **FOOD BANKS:** The food bank is requesting canned meat products, vegetables, fruits, soups, and tomato products (low sodium, if possible) for July; and Canned/dry beans, pasta and pasta sauce (no glass), rice, cereal, mac & cheese, chili for August You can deposit your donations in the boxes outside the Parish Hall, one at the front door and another at the south door near the Chapel. Your offerings will be blessed on the first Sunday of each month.

▶ The Sahuarita Food Bank collects cardboard—that includes cereal box styles as well as clean milk cartons. The receptacle is located on the south side of the Food Bank, beside the Good Shepherd Church on La Cañada.

▶ Please deposit reusable grocery bags and Dollar store bags in the Kino box in the Donations room. These bags will be put to good use by people returning home to Mexico. They could also use travel-sized hygiene products, especially bar soap.

▶ Remember, donations of money are always welcome for any of our ministries—simply write your check payable to St. Francis with the ministry name in the memo line and we'll take care of the rest. Drop your check in the Offering Basket on Sunday morning or drop it off at the Parish Office during the week.

▶ And most importantly—if you have a Passion for a Ministry—bring your voice to a Heart and Hands meeting the third Monday of the month at 10 o'clock in Meeting Room 2 across the hall from the Library. A special thank you to Joyce Davison who has volunteered to be the meeting coordinator during the summer. ✝

News from Your Treasurer

I thought it might be good to share a summary of where our pledge and non-pledge regular income is at this point in the year versus our annual budget. As you can see, income is not quite where it should be at this point in the year and expenses are trending better than budget. Regarding expenses, it is important to note that the spring and summer months typically are the least expensive months. Additionally, \$2,480 of Capital Project income has been received and there has been \$12,671 spent on Capital Projects.
