From our Interim Rector . . .

PREPARE TO EMBRACE THE FUTURE

Sylvia and I moved from California to Arizona in 2017. Family economics motivated us, and we called our family migration 'our adventure.' Our challenge was what to do with the accumulated memorabilia of two lifetimes and a 28-year marriage, all stowed in our capacious California home of 23 years.

How will we accommodate the furniture, the books, the photos, the furnishings—all loaded and precious with memories and meaning that mark our lifetimes—when we are moving to a new home with more windows and light, but with much less storage space? When we looked at our belongings we felt our beloved past suddenly cast a menacing shadow over our bright future. So with much discussion, we gave away 90% of our furniture. I sold 1000 books from my library. We left behind 60% of our wardrobe and furnishings. We decided we had to let go of that much of our California past in order to make space for a bright Arizona future.

As it turned out for us, many of the essentials from our past that we did pack up and bring we quickly learned were not essential for the Arizona future we have gladly embraced. Now they recognize me at Goodwill when I drive up to drop off another carload of 'essentials.'

In Lent, we are letting go of parts of our past—the good and the bad of it: freeing up spiritual space and energy, in order to embrace the bright future God is offering us. Our past is made up of so many precious things: memories, stories, photos, memorabilia. But we spend a lot of energy and attention storing and maintaining all that material past: energy and attention we will need in order to discern and embrace the new future God offers us.

This spring, I invite you to the observance of a holy Lent. Choose a worship discipline which helps you to cherish and release some of your past, through both thanksgiving and repentance. Then come to our Wednesday lenten suppers, and let visionary speakers help you to discern and embrace what is coming: God's future for you.

Senior Warden's Notes

To lay the groundwork for what I will be writing about in the next ten months I refer to what Admiral James Stavridis, USN (Ret) writes in his introduction to his book *Sailing True North. Ten Admirals and the Voyage of Character*. . . “I wish to illuminate...the most essential qualities of character...demonstrate how they contribute to effective leadership and make the case that by using this information, each of us can chart a course toward becoming the best we can possibly be within our own lives. That voyage of character is the most important journey each of us ever makes.” He adds . . . “I am also motivated by a growing sense...that we are witnessing the slow death of character, driven by a global popular culture that has tuned increasingly away from classic values—honesty, commitment, resilience, accountability, moderation—to a world that moves at breakneck speed and refuses to slow down and consider what is right and just.”

We learn from these ten admirals he writes about that the quality of finding sufficient time to think and reflect is a crucial part of building character. And he adds the following defining observation...“character is what you do when you think no one is looking.”

Now to move on to our first example of a quality of character that stands a commander well above his contemporaries, and certainly beyond the expectations of his fiercest enemies. As the history of famous sea battles survives the ages, one in particular stands out: that being the half-century nightmare of the Persian invasions of Greece between 499 and 449 B.C.

One of our author's favorite readings of those early sea battles featured Themistocles, the Athenian admiral who won a pivotal battle at Salamis, where he found himself outmanned and outnumbered by manpower and number of oar-propelled warships by five to one. His strategy was to lure the much larger fleet into the confined waters of the Straits of Salamis off the coast of Athens, and he then led his free Greeks to victory over the much larger number of oarsmen of the Persian fleet.

And what was it that set Themistocles apart from his contemporaries? Was it a birthright he had inherited? Was it the reputation of the schools that provided the basis for his naval training? Was it the caliber of the leaders who taught from their own experiences, and were supported by the oral histories of a number of other exceptional heroes of the present and earlier decades?

What was quickly recognized in this popular and highly respected naval officer was the vision for success which he employed to sell his countrymen on the need for Athens and its sister seaport of Piraeus to become a maritime contender, and to do this required the near total commitment of financial backing to build a fleet of fighting ships manned by highly

trained crews of both officers and able bodied seamen.

Sailing against the Persian fleet required Themistocles to expend every bit of his tactical brilliance and personal charisma, supported by every man and every oar in his vastly outnumbered fleet.

In the end, it was an extraordinary victory, and one that is still studied at the Naval Academy. It reflected not only the tactical brilliance of Themistocles, but also his character; the ability to reach deeply inside himself, at a moment when everyone around him was frightened and fearing the worst, and rally people to his cause. Themistocles possessed a combination of vision, energy, and charisma, that has seldom been equaled in naval history.

Themistocles demonstrated the power of persuasion through his use of vision, decisiveness, and resilience to foster the role of Creativity, a significant component when considering what it takes to fully develop the most desirous qualities of character traits in our leaders, past, present, and future, and other key features that contribute to the full development of the necessary components which are the building blocks of Character, through the roles played by some of our most influential naval officers, past and present, and all having served as Navy Admirals.

Become an Honorary Grandparent

Once again we invite all parishioners to participate in our partnership ministry of nearly eight years with the Imago Dei Middle School in Tucson. The school, one of five schools operating under the umbrella of the Arizona Episcopal Schools Foundation, operates with grades five through eight, 5½ days a week, 11 months a year. The curriculum is specifically designed to help bring students, many of whom may be a year or two behind their peers when they begin as a fifth-grade scholar, up to that expected for their appropriate age level by the time they graduate from eighth grade. Most often English is the second language in their homes, if at all, as well as the home being parented by a single parent. Nearly all families involved are at poverty level or below. All things considered, these young scholars certainly deserve special recognition for the four years of impressive academic achievement they worked so hard for.

The families are proud of their student's accomplishments and we should be as well. Our goal again this year is to raise through contributions from you, our

parishioners, \$2,000 to give us the opportunity to provide each of the twenty 8th grade graduating scholars a \$100 Visa Gift Card in recognition of their academic achievements. Make your checks payable to St. Francis, with the notation *Imago Dei Middle School* on the memo line, and place in the offering plate or drop off in the Parish Office.

Graduation is set for some time during the third week in May in Tucson, and we will share more details soon as to the specific date and location of the commencement exercises. We hope to see you there as "Honorary Grandparents!" In recent years, we've had as many as three dozen parishioners attending graduation, and this year I'd love to see that number grow to four or even five dozen attending as Honorary Grandparents. Stay tuned for additional information as it becomes available. I thank you for responding to our invitation to share in this most worthwhile and gratifying ministry. Lenten Liturgical Music

Lent begins with the Ash Wednesday liturgy and ends with the reading of one of the Passion narratives appointed for Palm Sunday—Matthew, Mark or Luke. (Holy Week is sometimes added into the season, thus marking the end of Lent as Holy Saturday.)

The Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days of the season (all Sundays being understood as feasts of the Resurrection) although the atmosphere, both liturgical and musical, in the Sunday liturgies is somewhat subdued. In Lent we don't add things to sing; we take some things away. For example, the *Gloria in excelsis Deo* (Glory to God in the highest) is not sung in Lent (it returns at the Great Vigil of Easter), and—the one we always remember to forget—*Alleluia* is not said (or sung) before and after the *Pascha nostrum* (Christ our Passover...); it also disappears from the Dismissal. Lenten hymns (all 13 of them) are devoid of 'alleluias' too, and the character of hymnody during this penitential season is, again, somewhat subdued. (Some hymns traditionally associated with Lent are hidden away in the present Hymnal; that is, they are not to be found in the 'Lent' section, but elsewhere in the book.)

The Great Litany (Prayer Book page 148) is usually sung (or said) on the First Sunday in Lent; it sets

a solemn tone for the weeks to follow.

There is a great deal of choral music (and organ music too) for Lent. It ranges in character from the stoical to the insufferably sentimental. More music is written today for Lent and Holy Week than for any of the other liturgical seasons, or so it seems to this observer. Most of it is set to traditional texts associated with the season. How much of it will survive is anybody's guess.

The serious and solemn tone of Lent is lifted somewhat on the Fourth Sunday, known as 'Mid-Lent.' Alleluias are still avoided, but rose-colored vestments are donned by the clergy and choral and organ music—hymns too—take on a brighter aspect. Then it's back to business on the Fifth Sunday, Psalm 130 (Out of the depths...) and all.

The Book of Common Prayer (page 265) invites all Christians "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word." The music of Lent takes up these themes, and the best of it doesn't attempt to reduce us to tears or invite us to beat ourselves up. That said, it's still probably not appropriate to wish you a 'happy Lent.' But I'll do it anyway: happy Lent.
