From Fr. Warren . . .

Dear Friends,

Growing up in the 1960's and '70's, I was drawn to the TV every time there was a launch of a rocket into space. Like many of you, I watched Neil Armstrong's walk on the moon, the first takeoff and landing of a space shuttle, the building of the International Space Station, and the landing of the first Mars Rover.

As I write this March article, I just watched the successful landing of the newest Nasa Mars Space Rover called Perseverance. I felt like a kid again as they counted down the entry into the Mars atmosphere and I felt the tension experienced by the engineers and scientists as they waited for the landing—the deployment of the parachute, the separation of the lander, and then the landing itself. Flying at nearly 12,000 MPH there wasn't any margin for error!

It is one thing to look up at the stars and the planets, it is another thing to develop a craft to leave this planet and land on another world. The creative power given to humankind is endless. God has given us the ability to make science fiction become reality.

The ability to bring an idea to life takes trial and error. Half the attempts to land on Mars ended in failure, but it takes perseverance, the name of the new rover, to achieve success. So does faith. Once we accept Jesus into our lives, the work begins.

Faith is like the space program. It takes strength and perseverance. We all have ideas about faith, Christ, God and the universe, but incorporating faith into our lives takes trial and error. We have the amazing moments, the mountain top experiences that make us feel close to God. We also have times when we hit crossroads and dead-ends, many times caused by situations beyond our control. Do we give up? Turn around? Or do we seek God for direction and strength?

We are now on our Lenten journey that may take us up the mountain or down into the deep valleys. Lent calls us to a time of introspection, prayer, repentance, devotions and worship. Reconciliation with God and friends and family are also part of our Lenten practices. But the work of Lent, like life itself, takes perseverance and time. You may discover that Lent is only the beginning of a new direction in your life of faith or relationships with others. Ask God to help move you forward or to lift you up.

I pray you have a Holy Lent. Use this time of Lent as a time to catch your breath. Take time to pray and to reflect on God's Word; go for a walk and explore God's creation; come to our services or watch online. Whatever you choose to do, use Lent as a special time for you. Lenten Blessings,

Embodied Bible Study

On January 4 Fr. Nelson began an "Embodied Bible Study" group offered weekly through Zoom.

CURIOUS ABOUT THE CURATE

It has been an intriguing time to begin my vocational ministry as you all have heard me mention a few times in the past. As I approach my 9 month mark with you all here at St. Francis, it has been a reminder of some of the great things we've been able to accomplish together in such a short amount of time. From Bible studies and focused theological conversations to facilitating both online and in-person worship, it has certainly been a whirlwind the past couple of months.

And yet, it has come to my understanding that many still don't understand what a "Curate" actually is at a church. In borrowing from Wikipedia, "In the Church of England today, 'curate' refers to priests (or, in the first year, transitional deacons) who are in their first post after ordination, and are completing their training (not unlike an apprenticeship). The technical term 'curate,' as found in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, meant the incumbent of a benefice, that is the person licensed by the diocesan bishop to the "cure of souls," who, depending on how the benefice income was raised and distributed, was a rector, a vicar, or a perpetual curate."

Specifically in our context, "In the Episcopal Church of the United States, the curacy may be a temporary place to continue training after ordination, similar to an internship, or it may be a permanent, subordinate position, more akin to a perpetual curate." So think of this as a residency that many new medical doctors participate in after their core studies of medical school.

As you all know, I graduated seminary in May of last year and just a few weeks later started my "curacy" here at St. Francis. It has been a wonderful time of learning, particularly during a pandemic, and I have been blessed with so many great interactions with each of you despite the obstacles of social distancing. While this has not been an ideal way to begin ministry, I have been grateful nonetheless to have my foundations start here in such a healthy congregation.

I look forward to future interactions and opportunities to do ministry with each of you during my time here at St. Francis. I hope you all feel that

even though I am a novice priest, I have a wealth of knowledge from various studies and experiences in my life. And most of all, my commitment to extending God's love to each of you is paramount in my responsibilities and my priestly role. In God's peace,

Praying on Nails

During this Lenten season we're offering what may be a different sort of discipline for you to try. This past Sunday, after the service, a basket of nails was available for anyone who wanted to take one—but these are not just any nails; these are substantial 4" nails, big enough to grasp in your hand and wrap your fingers around—and pray on the nail.

Pray your petitions to God for yourself—what you want and feel you need; what you wish God would do for you; what purpose you want God to use you for today; what your fears are holding you back from doing; what causes you pain; what are your dreams; what are your frustrations.

Pray your intercessions for others—what you want God to do for family and friends; for healing of body, mind, or spirit; for the Church; for our nation and all its present divisions; for the world, especially in this pandemic; for the big issues like climate change, racial and economic injustice, food insecurity, and educational turmoil; and for those things you think are too small to bother God about.

Pray those things you want to confess to God—the indiscretions; the untruths and exaggerations; the malicious and destructive gossip; the blindness and hardness of heart you turn to others not like you; the lack of will to change, to become a more loving person concerned for the well-being of both yourself and others.

Pray your thanksgivings—for all that God has already done for you; for relationships that bring you joy; for the beauty of the natural world; for the Church; for having a comfortable home and food on the table; for having (even a small amount of) discretionary income that you can use for the benefit of those who have less.

And praise God in prayer—praise the One who has created all, sustains all, and has redeemed all.

Keep your nail close to hand, in your pocket or purse, and pray on your nail all through Lent. Then,

on Good Friday, bring your nail with you to our church service. During the Veneration of the Cross, you may return your nail to the basket at the foot of the Cross, symbolically turning all those prayers over to Jesus. Unburden yourself by giving all those prayers over to the One who can shoulder them, who can show you the way forward through faith and trust and love.

For those of you who were not there in person at last Sunday's service, nails will be available at Saturday's communion-to-go drive through (or you can use any long nail you might already have in your home). We hope you will find this a meaningful practice during Lent, and that throughout the year you will feel more confident than ever in turning all your prayers over to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Thanks goes to Father Warren, Julie Reppenhaggen, former Junior Warden, John Colip, employee and Lead Sexton, and Craig Reid, volunteer landscape manager for facilitating this orientation.

A couple of building/space projects that were in progress have been completed. John Colip orchestrated these along with Vestry members and officers, clergy, church staff, Deb Harby, Financial Officer, and Gerald Near, Parish Administrator, employees Clyde Tardy and Sue Whitney, other Church Sextons, and, also, volunteer, Neal Hursh, who expertly handled the computer issues with furniture

moving in and out of offices, with the installation of new carpeting in five clergy and staff offices in the main office suite. The second building project entailed the replacement and painting of the weatherdamaged, wood structure of the overhang outside the Gift Shop. Thank you, John Colip.

The grounds are cared for year round by Craig Reid, landscape manager, and volunteers Mitch Ghoca, Ann Tenpenney, Arliene Stremming, Alicia Baucom, and Gary La Barre, and, of course, the three sextons. Recent projects include putting new rock on the front grounds along La Cañada to prevent runoff erosion, removing all the cholla and cholla pods blown on the ground, and the use of preemergence to control a new crop of spring weeds. Also, when you drive by the Church on La Cañada, you will also see the removal of silt in one rockedin area and the resetting of the rocks. Again, this is another endeavor to improve property appearance and prevent erosion.
