Franciscan Focus
St. Francis and the Fifth Crusade
Peace and Justice
Part 2

In Part I of our Franciscan Focus, I described the events and the desperate situation that beset the Christians in the Fifth Crusade in Egypt during Francis' stay there. Francis became disillusioned in his efforts to offer the solace of God's love to the beleaguered Crusaders who had suffered several military defeats and with the immorality prevalent in the Crusader's camp.

In spite of the Sultan's concessions and offers to negotiate a peace, all such attempts had been disregarded by Cardinal Pelagio, whom Pope Honorius III had put in charge of the crusade. Pelagio thought he could win in battle the peace conditions that the Sultan offered. He also wanted a decisive victory because he was trying to support the Italian merchants who wanted to continue their profitable trade in Egypt. Pelagio knew that if he succeeded it meant that it could cut off Egypt from Palestine (then occupied by the Muslims) and the Arab supply lines to the Egyptian wheat fields. This would put pressure on the Arabs to sur-

render Jerusalem itself.

But the situation continued to be increasingly desperate for the Christian soldiers. Their frustration was expressed in drinking, stealing and mingling with prostitutes. Even worse were the unspeakable atrocities the Christians committed. At one point, they had caught some Muslim spies coming to their camp and they tortured them by cutting off their ears, noses, lips, and gouging out their eyes. Following this, the Muslims quickly sought revenge and kidnapped women and children from the Christian camp and impaled them. And yet, even after all these atrocities, the Sultan offered more generous peace conditions and a large amount of money, only to be refused again by Pelagio.

Francis, who in his youth had been a knighted soldier, imprisoned, and accustomed to the horrors of war, could not just stay in the Crusader's camp and ignore the deplorable events and conditions that he witnessed. He confronted Pelagio and declared that if the Muslim peace negotiations were not going to be accepted, he wanted to go speak to the Sultan in person. Angrily at first, Pelagio told Francis to depart from his presence. Francis, however, was not to be denied from doing what he considered the work of God. Finally, Pelagio relented but disavowed all responsibility for the welfare of Francis and his fellow Franciscans.

Francis was not naive as to what would occur to him by entering the Sultan's camp. He believed he would suffer martyrdom at the hands of the Muslims. But he sincerely welcomed even this fate since its reward was eternal life in heaven. As it turned out, however, the Muslims spared his life because they thought Francis was a peace negotiator or holy man, since he dressed like their own mystics.

The Sultan who Francis met was hardly the beligerent tyrant the Christians imagined. Instead, he was a refined educated man, fond of religious poetry, an intellectual who had studied medicine and surrounded himself with learned men. Even more, the Sultan was tired of a war that solved nothing.

In the following Newsletter, we will examine the extent to which Francis was successful in negotiating an end to the conflict.

Junior Warden's Notes

Please welcome Jim Ratley, new Junior Warden for St. Francis in the Valley. He replaces Kristi Menix who served 2.5 years. He assumes responsibility the week of April 24 after transition meetings.

Activities and Projects:

1. Matt, Lead Sexton, is replacing a small number of soiled ceiling tiles throughout the meeting rooms and offices.

2. The grounds team will soon tackle an excavation project: April 25 and 26. We are renting a Bobcat (budgeted) to do erosion prevention, dirt, and gravel work east of the office complex. Thank you, Mark Stril, Reg Kahrmanis, and Craig Reid and other grounds team members.

3. April 24-29: Carpet and baseboard replacement project in Parish Hall, front office, Madeline Williams Room, and all adjacent halls. Carpet color: Hot Ashes! This project is trust and benefactor funded.

4. May 2 and 3, replacement of deteriorated pavement in the staff parking area and West, lower level of handicapped parking. New signage and striping will be also occur. This project is funded by trust and insurance monies.

5. One parking space at the north entrance into the Chapel will be striped as a no-parking space and sign added to designate a safer way to drop off and pickup space especially helpful to individuals with

mobility issues and devices. Thank you, Bernie Ravenelle for this safety suggestion.

6. The Green Team led by Susan Burch and Jon Nichols helped St. Francis celebrate Earth Day on April 22 and 23 by distributing packets of bird seed, planting turpentine and a fairy duster shrubs on the grounds, giving tours to parishioners of various areas on Church grounds where passive water harvesting has been manually created—thank you, Reg, and lastly, showing a music-enhanced slide presentation during coffee hour featuring beautiful photos of God's Creation at St. Francis and the grounds team, who keeps our campus beautiful and functional, and photos of God's Creation outside of St. Francis like nearby Madera Canyon. Great job, Susan and Jon and team!

7. You will notice new, blue recycling containers in multiple places around our campus. Please note that paper must be at least 2 x 2 inches for recycling and post it notes are recyclable as the adhesive breaks down in the recycling process. Soda cans and other cans are being collected. We have learned that we can take our cardboard to the Sahuarita Food Bank to be bundled and sold by the Food Bank. Thank you, Carol and David Vleck, for being the St. Francis link to the Food Bank.

8. An architect has assessed the columbarium wall of the Memorial Garden to recommend how to stop the brick deterioration and to restore some affected brick. We are waiting on his report, so we can select a contractor to do the work.

9. The East entrance to the Courtyard has been enhanced with a 3-tiered fountain planted with cacti and succulents. A statue of St. Francis oversees this new addition! Thank you, Susan Davis. Also, you will notice a rejuvenation of pots and plants across from the planted fountain. One pot has received colorful rejuvenation from Paula Altamirano, talented St. Francis artist. Thank you, Paula.
