A few days ago I saw part of an old LITTLE HOUSE ON THE PRAIRIE episode. The story reminded me that no matter how technologically advanced we are in agriculture, we are still dependent on good weather conditions. Words from Fr. Nelson ... DRY TURKEY

As the holidays approach, an awareness or curiosity grows within me each year. While many of us might have the blessing of being able to gather near with loved ones, there are still many who will not be able to spend the holidays with those who might be close to their heart but far from their hands. This is due to a variety of reasons ranging from ongoing pandemic restrictions, distance, economic restraints, and more but the thing they all have in common is the simple fact that the ability to not be together can leave a distinct impression of sadness, loneliness, and beyond.

Growing up, my mother worked two full-time jobs to be able to provide for my brother and myself. She would often be up before he and I would wake and I would only have the lingering smell of her hairspray in the bathroom when I would rise. This would leave me to take care of myself and my brother on many days, but especially on holidays. Of course there were times when this was hard on us but I can't imagine the weight this put on her as a single mother.

I know that I had to grow up sooner than many of my friends because of this as I was taking care of my brother when I was as young as 7 years old. Despite all of this, my mom still provided, I became a "parent" as a child, and my brother was difficult, as many younger brothers can often be.

One Thanksgiving, my mother had purchased all of the necessary things for our meal but had to work from about 4 AM to 7 PM that day. I assured her that I would take care of all the cooking despite being just 12 years old and she had no option but to oblige so she went off to work.

My brother and I had a tradition we had developed where we would watch the Thanksgiving Day parade and that's when we would start preparing all of the meal items for dinner. Mom would normally prep the turkey but the rest of the sides were our responsibility. And so we began to work hard on our mashed potatoes, mac and cheese (we grew up in Southern Virginia), greens, stuffing, and sweet potato pie.

At some point throughout all of this we had taken the turkey out so that we could finish the rest of the side items but then noticed we had forgotten to put the turkey back in as mom called a few hours before her arrival. Naturally, my brother Chris and I panicked so we shoved the turkey back in and set it at a higher setting than we should have.

Right as my mother came home we decorated our table, set out all of the side items, and then my mom pulled out

we did as good of a job as we normally did despite being a poor, lower income family who cooked mostly from boxed meals. However, it was the initial nibble of the turkey that will always stay with me to this day.

You see, the turkey was super dry. Almost like jerky. There wasn't enough gravy in the world that could salvage this dry turkey, and yet my mom ate it proudly and without verbal complaints. My brother and I tried to consume as much as we could but we ended up just eating lots of mac and cheese and sparing the turkey.

A few years later,

once I had improved my culinary skills, I brought the story up to my mother and she laughed and laughed and laughed. I asked her, "mom, why didn't you say anything or keep eating the clearly bad turkey?"

She responded, "Anak (my child), because you and your brother lovingly made the meal and despite the dry turkey, we still had food and each other."

So, while the holiday season approaches in a way that might still be different or not the perfect way we would imagine, I think it's important to remember that while the turkey might be dry—we will be fed and we will have each other. And I think God delights in that for all of us.

Important Changes for Sunday Worship

The access to COVID 19 boosters is adding an extra layer of safety allowing us to relax some of the protocols during Sunday worship.

Beginning Sunday, November 7,

·all pews will be open for seating,

·the main (East) door into the Narthex will be open to welcome worshippers,

·worshippers wishing to receive Communion will be invited to receive the elements at one of two standing Communion stations at the front of the church.

·Communion wafers will no longer be in plastic baggies, and

·Communion wine will be available by intinction only for those wishing to receive wine.

To avoid crowding the aisle during the distribution of Communion, only one row at a time will move forward; masks will still be required in large groups such as worship services for the time being.

These changes are a step forward to the full removal of COVID 19 protocols. However, we will continue to keep an eye on COVID variants and are prepared to bring back restrictions if the need arises in order to protect those who have underlying health conditions.

So I wanted to gently remind you of how important it is for all of us to keep an eye out for that new face among us, and make every effort to extend our warmest welcome. - 1. Thank you, Fred Keller, for your donation of a printer to the Church. It will be part of the electronic setup for the Library and Resource Center. The Center is getting a new look and some tender loving care by Joyce Davison and the new Library and Resource Center Ministry. This is exciting!
- 2. An assortment of pillows is now available in the front Chapel chairs as well as on the benches in the back of the Church proper. The pillows are available for anyone needing lumbar or other support. Thank you, Father Nelson for alerting us to this need.
- 3. The installing carpet company has recently reglued some loose parts of the transition trim between the carpeting and the luxury vinyl plank in the Parish Hall.
